Dear Congressman Ryan:

Thank you for your recent letter regarding our efforts to continuously improve our Electronic Health Records (EHR) system, VistA, and encouraging us to work closely with commercial off the shelf (COTS) solution providers in the private sector.

As you may be aware, VA has a long and very successful history in developing and using EHR systems. We have been a leader in the creation and adoption of these systems nationwide. VistA itself has won many awards, including being recognized by the John F. Kennedy School for Government at Harvard University as a recipient of the prestigious Innovations in American Government Award. VistA has long served as the standard for EHR systems in government and in the private sector.

As we look to continuously modernize VistA to keep it among the best EHRs in the nation, we have determined that our best path forward is to buy and integrate COTS products into VistA rather than continuing to create new functionality ourselves. We are, in fact, doing just that with products from Cerner Corporation, First DataBank, InterSystems, and several others.

To make it easier for proprietary product vendors to work with and sell to the VA, we are exploring using an "Open Source" model for all future VistA development. Under the Open Source model, we would encourage COTS product vendors, and others, to contribute changes to the VistA code that would make it easier for COTS packages to be integrated into VistA and marketed to VA hospitals. This will have the effect of opening up several billion dollars of our annual spending for much broader private sector competition. We hope to announce a final decision to proceed on this process before the end of February.

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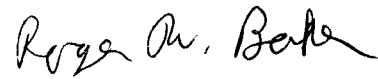

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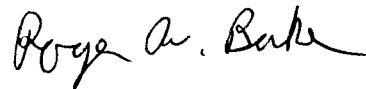
